Vicar's Letter

One of the programmes I enjoy watching on television is "Who do you think you are?" The last one I saw featured Ralph Little, who stars in the detective series set in the Caribbean, "Death in Paradise".

I find it interesting learning about the backgrounds of people we know from film and television.

As human beings we are all either open or closed about who we really are. When we are closed we try to protect ourselves and by hiding who we really are. by wearing masks, playing games or roles and deny what is truly going on behind that facade. Conversely, when we are open, we are willing to learn, open ourselves up and truly experience what is happening by being vulnerable. So why do we choose to be open or closed? Maybe it has something to do with this quote from John Powell, "I am afraid to tell you who I am because, if I let you see the real me, you may not like who I am, and it is all that I have." John Powell was a Jesuit priest and associate professor of theology and psychology. He is the author of a number of books including one called, "Why am I afraid to tell you who I am?" In it he says this: I am not what I think I am; I am not what you think I am; I am what I think you think I am.

The problem is that so many people aren't really sure who they are. That may sound silly but it is a serious point. We all know who we are well enough when it comes to knowing our names and our personal information but do you know who you really are in Christ? It is a tremendously freeing thing to know who you are and where your identity as a person actually comes from. Christians believe our identity comes from God. He states who you are when he calls you by name. Then you become a member of His family, you are a son or a daughter of the King.

It's a tremendously uplifting and freeing thing to know who we are in Christ; an identity that doesn't come from any of our achievements or successes. When our identity rests only on what we can do or achieve in life, we stand on very unstable ground indeed. We can only feel secure as people when we are achieving. We can only feel good about ourselves when we are receiving praise. If, for whatever reason, that disappears it's like a 1000 foot drop and we are easily crushed.

However, when our identity is determined, not by what we do, but by who we are then we are secure. When we know who we are in Christ. When we know that we are loved and appreciated by our heavenly Father solely because we matter to Him and because he loves us then we have a security nothing else in life can ever equal and an identity nothing can take from us. God says through the prophet Isaiah, "Fear not for I have redeemed you, I have called you by name; you are mine."

ST MARY'S, BARTON MILLS, PRESERVATION CHARITABLE TRUST



Dear Villagers,

This month I am writing to you on a rather more sombre note, because our Church, churchyard and Church Room really need quite a lot of financial support to remain in a good state.

While we completely understand that not everyone wants to be a 'church-goer' we do hope we are right in thinking that everyone appreciates the lovely old building, and the reasonably good state that it is in currently, which makes it a super venue for some types of village event, whether you are or are not a regular attender. Just the pure history of the building, and the workmanship of those early builders is quite marvellous and in some ways we are lucky that the main structure is sound. However, there are still plenty of jobs that need doing to keep it that way. The Parochial Church Council... the PCC, is governing a fairly small regular congregation and on their own cannot produce the income needed for maintenance, let alone replacement of certain elements. This is why the body of the Preservation Trust was formed; in order that a wider group of residents, with an affection and respect for the building as a place of remembrance and celebration as well as worship, would be encouraged to fund-raise and support the PCC in looking after it.

The cost of pollarding the Lime trees alongside Church Meadow is going to be £4,500.00 and is becoming urgent.

The cost of clearing off unsuitable plaster and repointing, replastering and repainting the interior of the north wall, behind the organ, with appropriate lime-based products £1,400.00 in order to eliminate the occurrence of damp; not to mention that other sections of the interior walls appear to have similar problems. The Churchyard gates are in a poor state and we hope to replace them with something commemorating the Queen's platinum Jubilee as per the wishes expressed by Joy Willis' family, but again this will come at some cost.

The pathways into and around the church need upgrading to be truly 'mobility' friendly as the gravel impedes folk using rollators or wheelchairs. Nothing comes for free!

We were really pleased to see a lot of you at the recent concert and are grateful for your support. It may surprise you to know however that the profit from that was only just over £100.00. We are very happy to continue putting on events that everyone enjoys, but don't think this means we have an embarrassment of riches.

The piece of land near the house, now the home of the Village Allotments, was an orchard and the large field adjacent to it was always commonly referred to as the "cornfield". This field echoed to the sound of laughter and fun for my father and his siblings, along with their village friends, as they followed the "reaping machine", known as a binder, trying to catch the rabbits which had once felt secure in the corn.

On completion of the harvest a great feast was enjoyed, the celebrations then culminated in services at the Church and Chapel, giving everyone the opportunity to publicly reflect on God's goodness and to thank Him for keeping that wonderful promise recorded in Genesis Ch 8 v 22 "While the earth remaineth, seedtime and harvest, and cold and heat and summer and winter, and day and night shall not cease". Even though the weather this year has not been conducive to the Harvest and bread prices have risen, we too can say "All is safely gathered in ere the winter storms begin" and rejoice that the promise remains!

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 3rd August with a picnic on the field at 12.30 (weather permitting)



Stevens' Mill stands at the entrance of the Museum and visitors can take a tour of the mill on four floors — several of our ladies did just that. There is a wide variety of things to be looked at, from a reconstruction of a Roman potter's workshop, to household items that some of us remembered from childhood. Lots of agricultural farm machinery showing how farmers went about their daily life, a school room, a shop, a telephone exchange — an endless list. Some buildings have been moved from other sites and carefully reconstructed.

Nature notes - In praise of nettles.

No one likes being stung by stinging nettles but they can be utilised in many ways including making green and yellow dyes for textiles. They are used in foodstuffs such as wine gums and jelly babies. Wines, cordials, salt, beer and oils may be flavoured by nettles. They are high in iron and potassium so, used like spinach, they can be added to soups, stews and pizzas.

If you are picking any, beware as they may be supporting a lot of aphids. 31 species of insects are solely dependent on nettles including many beetles and butterflies - including some of our most colourful species e.g. peacock, red admiral and small tortoiseshell. Many more beetles and bugs make some use of nettles.

Nettle fibres are suitable for making cloth and also cord, which is evidently long-lasting. The nettle binding of a flint arrow head dug up in Somerset was dated to 4000 - 3500 BC.

Good Neighbour Scheme -Independence

As I write this article my thoughts are dwelling on the subject of "independence". On 4th July the citizens of the United States of America remembered and celebrated the independence of their country from its colonial rulers - the British. However our destinies have over the passing

years been intertwined and our mutual friendship has endured.

We all value our independence but we forget that, at times, to be able to maintain our independence we can benefit from the helping hand of friends and neighbours, even if that is just a small favour when needed. I recently underwent day surgery at West Suffolk Hospital and the surgeon insisted that I had to have someone fetch me after the operation and be present in my house with me for at least the following 24 hours. My son came from his home in Hampshire to fulfil this role but the offers of help from friends and neighbours, should I need it, was humbling. It is great to know that these very caring people, one of whom lives 40 miles from here, showed their concern that I (and my cats) should be properly supported.

The volunteers that willingly offer their time and abilities, via the Barton Mills Good Neighbour Scheme, to support someone in need are equally caring and concerned to enable our fellow villagers to maintain their independence. We provide practical help rather than medical services. which are rightfully the domain of medical-related organisations, and we cannot undertake work that requires the services of professionally qualified and certificated tradespeople. However, the practical help that we can offer includes shopping; collecting prescriptions; help with IT, TVs and smart 'phones; moving furniture; one-off garden tidy-ups; help with pets; etc. or just a volunteer calling in for a chat that will help to lift the spirits.

September in the UK is a time when many of our British apples are in season. Do you have an apple tree in your garden? What do you so with its produce? Here are some recipes you may like to try.....

Mary Berry's Apple Sandwich Cake

Ingredients For the sponge

225g/8oz baking spread, straight from the fridge, plus extra for greasing

225g/8oz caster sugar

225g/8oz self-raising flour

1 tsp baking powder

4 large free-range eggs, beaten

2 eating apples, peeled, cored and grated (see Recipe Tips) icing sugar, for dusting

You will need two 20cm/8in round, loose-bottomed sandwich tins and an electric hand whisk.

For the lemon filling 150ml/5fl oz double cream 3 tbsp lemon curd

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4. Grease two 20cm/8in round, loose-bottomed sandwich tins and line the bases

with baking paper.

2. Measure all the sponge ingredients except the apple and icing sugar into a large bowl and beat with an electric hand whisk until combined. Fold the grated apple into the mixture, then divide between the tins and level the tops.

3. Bake in the oven for about 25-30 minutes until golden, well risen and coming away from the sides of the tins. Allow to cool in

the tins

4. Meanwhile, make the filling. Whip the cream into soft peaks in a bowl, then lightly swirl in the lemon curd. Invert the tins to remove the cakes and then peel away the paper. Sit one cake upside down on a serving plate. Spread the lemon cream to the edge of the sponge, place the other cake gently on top to sandwich the cakes together.

5. Dust the top with icing sugar to serve.

Or you might like to try these WW2 war-time recipes reproduced from past issues of the BARTON MILLER (Sept and Oct 2002).

Apple Cream - a recipe from Northumberland
Peel, core and grate the quantity of apples that
you require. Mix quickly with sweetened
condensed milk. Heap into a glass dish, this makes
a delicious dessert, which children especially love.

Apple Marmalade Charlotte - a 1940's recipe from Leicestershire

Left over bread and butter or thin slices of plain bread - about 11b/450g

2 oz/50g Marmalade 1 egg

1/2pt/300ml Milk Sugar to taste

1/2lb/225g apples

Put a layer of bread into a greased pie-dish and cover with a layer of sliced apple and a little marmalade. Cover with bread. Fill the dish this way and then beat the egg in the milk and pour over. Sprinkle with sugar if required. Bake in a moderate oven for 30-35 minutes.




